



Minutes 7/19/10

Meeting was called to order at 10:00 a.m. by president Rosalie Brown.

Minutes of the June, 2010, were accepted with no corrections.

Treasurer: There was no report as Treasurer Ingrid Kross was not at the meeting. New member checks will be deposited upon her return.

Library: Mary Lou Birns reported that Dolly Gaus has donated over 100 books to the guild library. Mary Lou is in the process of inventorying them and will compile a bibliography of the additions. Rosalie Brown thanked Mary Lou for her indefatigable efforts on behalf of the ever-growing collection. Dolly Gaus will also be formally thanked for her generous donation.

Newsletter: Barbara Frey will make use of the sample books donated by Dolly Gaus for future newsletter insertions.

Programs: Judy Mooers said that the 2 ½ day silk reeling workshop will take place April 18-20, 2011. A location is still needed. In August, Sandi Petty will do a program on transparences. In September, the results of the cotton challenge will be displayed.*

Montpelier will be the first weekend in October.

The Chesapeake festival is in the process of revamping. Rosalie suggested that WSWG participate in helping to rebuild it. Judy Mooers suggested strongly that the sheep to shawl event be a demonstration not a competition. Rosalie will get more information on the restructuring and dates of the event.

The Newport Folk Festival is the first weekend in October. Its emphasis is more on knitting. Barbara Frey will be there.

Hughlett's Tavern in Heathsville has the local weaver's guild working at the 3 looms and 2 spinning wheels on Tuesdays and Saturdays. More information about this historic inn and tavern can be found at www.rhhtfoundationn.org.

The Knitting Guild of Tidewater will be having a "knit or spin on the porch" at the Gloucester History Museum on Main Street on Saturday, August 14. Bring a chair, whatever you are working on, water, and, if desired, lunch.

The Virginia State Fair begins on Sept. 23. Entry forms are due in around Sept.3-5. Entries must be in by Sept. 19.


