Minutes November 16, 2009

The meeting was called to order at 10 a.m. by Vice President Judy Mooers who reported that President Rosalie Brown is busy cleaning up after the recent nor'easter. Judy introduced visitor Gail Michelle who lives in Toano.

Minutes for our October 19 meeting were accepted as published. Barbara Frey, newsletter editor, reminded us that she always welcomes content.

Treasurer Ingrid Kross reports a current balance of \$3,375.46 in our account. Annual dues of \$20 for 2010 should be paid now.

Library — Shawn Clarke reported that we now own the Peter Collingwood video (to be viewed at the meeting today) and at least one book by Peter Collingwood. Both are available for loan to our members. Marsha Rehkamp showed some magazines from our periodical collection with articles on holiday decorations or Christmas themes.

We discussed the need the find a new home for the guild library as Shawn Clarke will be moving soon. Mary Lou Birns offered to house the entire library and guild members gratefully accepted her offer. Shawn will give the list of guild holdings to Dave Banks to post on our web site.

Programs — Judy Mooers reviewed plans for upcoming programs.

In December we'll have our fashion show of handmade items, our gift exchange of cards embellished with some textile art, and potluck luncheon. The guild decided to make and exchange notecards that use some fiber-related technique (e.g., weaving, knitting, crocheting, felting). Each participant is asked to create one card for every other participant. We discussed the means by which our embellishment can be affixed to the card. Suggestions included using double-sided tape, double-sided fusible interfacing, or wood glue.

We also discussed program ideas for 2010. Suggestions included topics such as finishing handwoven products, building a tapestry loom out of copper tubing, weaving transparencies, and a presentation by local textile artist Gail Nichols. We also discussed the possibility of hosting a multi-day workshop by Elaine Bradley or Judith MacKenzie McCuin.

Bashes — Rosalie Brown will host the bash on December 7 at her home in Mathews. She will cook up a large pot of soup for folks to share. Peggy Nacci encourages everyone to bring something from their stash or a white elephant for an impromptu gift exchange.

Snacks: December will be our annual guild potluck where everyone brings food to share.

Events — Made in Mathews Open Studio Tour is November 27 - 29th. Rosalie Brown of Bentwaters Farm is participating.

Rosalie will also participate in the Holiday House at Magnolia Grove on November 13 and 14.

The Mid-Atlantic Quilt Show at the Hampton Coliseum will be February 25-28, 2010. Our guild generally does a demonstration at this event and earns some income for doing it. Ingrid Kross passed around a sheet for folks to sign up to help with our booth at some point during the show.

Old Business — Beth Palmer reported for the nominating committee. Rosalie Brown has offered to continue as President. Sandi Petty has agreed to serve as Vice President with Judy Mooers assisting. Ingrid Kross has agreed to continue as Treasurer. Marsha Rehkamp has agreed to serve as Secretary. We will received additional nominations from the floor at our December meeting and also vote to elect new officers.

New Business — We received a note from Alice Noyes in her new home in Honolulu. She reports that she has much visual inspiration for her weaving.






