Sample Info

The sample for December is a ruffled scarf sample, woven by Hilary Ely, meeting the requirements for this year's challenge of lumpy/bumpy and the desire for a new scarf by Hilary's daughter.

December 2009 Woven by: Hilary Ely

Project and/or suggested use: Lumpy/bumpy challenge and another scarf for Jackie

Pattern and Source: Plain Weave - K. Kelley, Handwoven, Issue 143, Jan/Feb 2009, pp 34-35

Technique: plain weave!

Warp: 8/2 rayon and 18/2 merino wool
Tabby: ---Reed: 10 dpi

Sleyed: 1 per dent Sett: 10 epi Woven: approx. 9-10 ppi

Dimensions before washing: Length 42 1/2" Width: 9 1/4"

after washing: Length 18" Width: 8 1/2"

Finishing: Machine wash, gentle, warm/cold: about 4 minutes. Then another 2-4 minutes. Wash with

towel. Air dry.

Comments: Seems like it will never shrink - then wow! Scarf was 132" long before washing, 60" after.

Warp order: 3 merino

30 rayon) for this scarf: 8 repeats

3 merino)

Rayon: 5 x - 1 variegated)


1 solid


10 x - variegated) for each set

5 x - 1 variegated) of 30 ends

1 solid

Weave very gently, to just place weft.
