The Guild sponsored a five-day workshop for beginning weavers the week of April 23, in West Point. Elaine Bradley was the instructor. Judy Mooers and Sandi Petty lent a helping hand. Participants had a great time, and each left with their own handwoven sampler and scarf, as well as Elaine's terrific handouts and lots of enthusiastic encouragement and advice.

Weaving and Spinning Demonstration



Members spent the morning demonstrating spinning and weaving using wheels, drop spindles, a four-shaft Harrisville student floor loom, a box loom and CD "looms" at the Williamsburg Farmers Market in Merchants Square on April 28th. Although nothing was for sale, there was also a display of members' finished works including wall hangings, clothing, scarves and hand towels.

The group was surrounded by enthusiastic crowds all morning- children especially enjoyed trying their had at weaving on the floor loom! The Guild plans on doing a similar demonstration at the Farmers Market in the autumn, as well as two "Children's Craft Day" projects at the Market over the course of the summer.
