**Old Business**: The Guild received a thank you note from January's program presenter, Cate Kauffman.

Judy Mooers reported that Elaine Bradley is teaching a beginning weaving class from April 23-27 at St. John's in West Point. The cost is \$250. Five of the possible 12 slots have been filled. The Guild can use the February Quilt Show as an opportunity to publicize the workshop. Equipment will need to be borrowed from Guild members; a list of needs will be in the March newsletter.

The 2012 Mid-Atlantic Quilt Festival XXIII will run from Wednesday, February 22 through Saturday, February 25 at the Hampton Roads convention Center. Wednesday (around 2 pm) will be set-up; Thursday baby-sitting the set-up; Friday exhibiting & demonstrating from 10-6,

Saturday from 10-6 exhibiting, demonstrating, then breaking down the exhibit. Participants should pick up their passes at the Vender booth at the entrance to the hall. A color gamp and a shadow weave gamp will be set up on looms. CD and toothpick weaving kits are being made up for distribution.

Judy Mooers noted that the Quilt Show's emphasis and demands may no longer fit the Guild's needs. It may be time to change the Guild's public exposure venue. Williamsburg Farmers Market (Saturdays, April-October) and the Newport News Fall Festival of Folklife (Oct 6<sup>th</sup> & 7<sup>th</sup>) were suggested as alternatives. Kathy Kuhn will contact the Farmers Market about potentially demonstrating there on a monthly basis.

A motion was made and seconded to have the Guild apply for an honorarium booth at the Fall Festival of Folklife (Oct 6 & & 7) to demonstrate spinning and weaving. The motion passed unanimously.

# Determining Fiber Content with the Burn Test

- 1. To identify the fiber content of an unknown piece of fabric, cut off a piece of the fabric about 1" to 1-1/2" long by 1/8"-1/4" wide. To identify the fiber content of an unknown yarn, cut off
- a piece of the yarn about 1" to 1-1/2".

  2. With the tweezers, hold the fibers over the catch container

  3. With the match or lighter, set the fiber on fire and watch how the fiber reacts to the flame, the smell or odor of the smoke, and the appearance of the ash. Compare your observations to the chart below.

Note: If the fabric/yarn is a blend or if the fabric/yarn is treated (sizing or finishes), the burn test will product unreliable results.
